PANTRY PESTS - monitor, prevent, and manage

Pantry pests are insects introduced to your cupboards from dry goods. They can easily escape and infest other stored items in your cabinets, ruining other food stores and costing you money. Use this document to familiarize yourself with common signs, how to prevent them, and what to do if you find an infestation in your home.

Monitor

Common signs of pest contamination are:

- Silken webbing or threads
- Frass collecting at the bottom of the container
- Holes in dry grains and beans



Prevent

- Do not purchase damaged packages from the store
- Store items in dry, well-sealed, transparent containers
- Keep shelves clean of crumbs and spills
- Thoroughly wash and dry containers before refilling





Manage

- Throw out contaminated food and wash storage containers thoroughly
- Deep clean cabinets and other food storage areas
- Use pheromone traps to catch any survivors
- Keep dry items in the freezer until you are confident there are no more pests
