SUBJECT: REGISTRATION FEE WORKSHOP PUBLIC COMMENT EXTENSION

The Department of Pesticide Regulation (DPR) held a Registration Fee Workshop on Wednesday, January 14, 2015, to discuss an increase in registration fees for pesticide products. During the workshop, DPR announced that it would accept written comments until Friday, February 27, 2015. DPR is extending the public comment period to Friday, March 13, 2015. Comments may be submitted via email to <regfees@cdpr.ca.gov>.

Please note, Food and Agricultural Code (FAC) §12812(a) states "The director shall establish, by regulation, fees for the Department of Pesticide Regulation's registration program, as established pursuant to this division. The fees shall include, but are not limited to, the following: (1) annual fees for each product submitted for registration; (2) penalties for the late payment of registration fees; and (3) fees for amendments to registered products." Additionally, FAC §12812(c) states "The fees established pursuant to this section shall be set so that the total revenue collected each fiscal year is sufficient to support the expenditure levels for the registration program..."

Registration Fee Workshop Response to Comments and Questions

1. In response to questions and comments regarding pesticide registration fees at the federal level, the following is a link to U.S. EPA's website on the Pesticide Registration Improvement Extension Act (PRIA 3) of 2012: http://www2.epa.gov/pria-fees

At the federal level, fees for application for registration of a new pesticide product intended for food use containing a new active ingredient differ depending upon the type of products/division that will be reviewing the application:

- Registration Division (conventional chemicals): \$597,683
- ➤ Antimicrobial Division (food use): \$182,327 (if requesting a tolerance)
- Antimicrobial Division (outdoor non-food use): \$182,327
- ➤ Biopesticide Division (microbial or biochemical): \$48,621 (if requesting a tolerance)

- **3.** In response to comments and questions regarding notifications, DPR wants to clarify that under the proposed fee, *the amendment fee will apply to all types of pesticide product amendments, including substantive label amendments, non-substantive label amendments, label changes required by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency or any other federal or state agency, amendments to the formulation of the pesticide product, and notifications.*
- **4.** The following is a breakdown, by DPR Branch, of staff charged to the registration function:

- 5. In response to questions regarding the cost of transactions at evaluation stations within the Registration Branch, DPR does not track costs at the transactional level. In accordance with our governing statutes, DPR tracks total registration expenses. DPR is required pursuant to Food and Agriculture Code §12812, to set registration fees so that total revenue collected each fiscal year is sufficient to support expenditures for the total registration program.
- **6.** In response to comments and questions regarding the DPR Fund's balance and expenditures, DPR wants to note that pursuant to Food and Agriculture Code §12812, the registration program is required to be supported in full by registration fees.

8. In response to requests for projections beyond three years, Tables 1 and 2 list a five-year projection. DPR cautions that projections beyond three years are unreliable, as DPR cannot accurately estimate employee compensation changes the Governor and the different bargaining unions will agree to in the future. Since bargaining unit contracts are typically three-years at most and employee compensation costs account for most of the increases in program expenditures, DPR is most confident in its three-year projections. This is also the reason DPR is proposing to evaluate registration fees on a three-year cycle.
