Economic and Fiscal Impact Statement (Std. 399) Public Health Exemption (DPR 19-001) – Attachment

A.1. ESTIMATED PRIVATE SECTOR COST IMPACTS

The proposed regulatory action exempts public health agencies, or their contractors, from consent and notification requirements prior to pesticide applications during a declared health emergency or local health emergency. Granting an exemption from the consent and notice requirements will allow public health agencies to more quickly address and mitigate emerging public health emergencies. Declared health emergencies and local health emergencies which require use of this proposed exemption are likely to occur unexpectedly and infrequently; California experienced only one health emergency that would have required the proposed exemption in the past five years. Therefore, this proposed exemption will not have any impact on businesses or jobs in California.
